Great hope in a world of change: War, Peace and Global Turmoil

Christians are called always and in every circumstance to live hopefully; and our prayer for the season, written by Percy Dearmer, speaks of God setting before us the 'great hope that thy kingdom shall come on earth'.

Dearmer knew and lived through times of change and destruction, losing both his son and his wife to the First World War - his son to combat in the Dardanelles, and his wife to typhus when she, with Dearmer himself, were serving in an ambulance station in Serbia in 1915.



In our own day of global instability and unpredictable change, our calling stays the same: to live in great hope, and to pray, as Jesus taught us, 'thy kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven'. Our programme, built around the realities and threat of war and the Christian call to peace on earth, ponders how we may respond hopefully to the challenges and chaos of our own time.

How may we best care for the fragile earth, for the many dispossessed who wander it seeking safety, for those who are caught up in the war and unrest that dominate today's geopolitics and empire building? And how may we continue, in the face of so much uncertainty, to live lives of praise, prayer and joy?

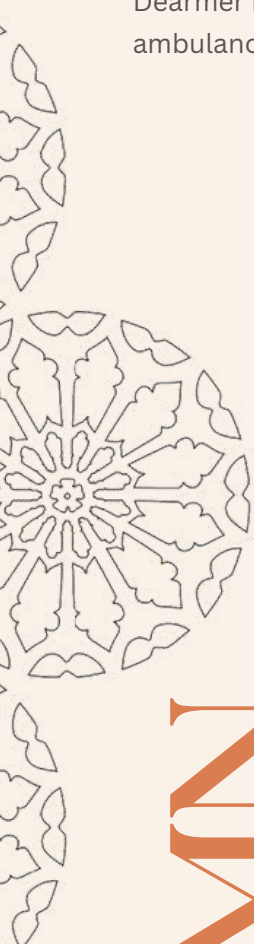
All these themes are explored in different ways across the preaching, worship, learning, experiences and formation set out in this programme.

The Luke Jerram installation, Mars: War and Peace, forms the focus for our reflection on how we live hopefully in our dramatically changing and increasingly warlike world.

MORNING PRAYER:

This reflective quiet service to start the day uses the Church of England readings and psalms for the Daily Office.

EUCCHARIST:

The Eucharist is at the heart of Christian worship. God invites us to his table through the gift of his Son Jesus, as a foretaste of the heavenly banquet which he has prepared for people of all nations and cultures.

CHORAL EVENSONG:

This meditative and reflective service sung by the Cathedral Choir lasts for around 45 minutes, giving space to pause for a moment as the day draws to a close.

EVENING PRAYER:

Evening Prayer is a simple, short spoken service which takes place at 5.15pm on days when there is no choir. It lasts for around 20 minutes.

Dr Jared Neusch, St Mellitus and children's author



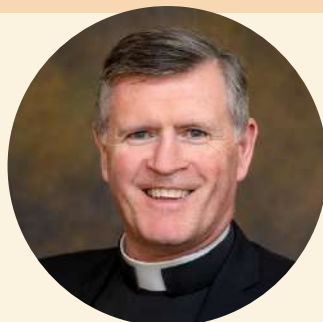

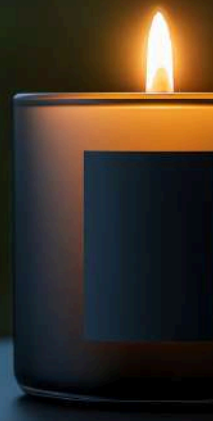

KEENE LECTURES



The Keene Lectures discuss contemporary theological issues and are delivered annually in Chelmsford Cathedral. They take their name from John Henry Keene, a prominent citizen of Chelmsford, in whose memory a fund was established to bring distinguished speakers to Chelmsford for this purpose.

7 October: 7.00pm

Jesus, Hitler, and How to win a Culture War

Hitler and the Nazis have long served as the West's moral reference point for evil, but this consensus is now unravelling. This lecture by Professor Alec Ryrie will trace how our values were built around the memory of World War II and why this framework is no longer sufficient for our current challenges.

Ryrie, a Professor of the History of Christianity at Durham University and a Fellow of the British Academy, will explore themes from his recent book, *The Age of Hitler and How We Will Survive It*. He will argue that the resolution to our present predicaments may be more hopeful than we realise.



28 October: 7.00pm

Is reconciliation possible in a divided world?

John is the Dean of Coventry, leading the Cathedral's ministry locally and internationally. The Cathedral is renowned for its reconciliation work, initiated after its destruction in 1940.

With a background in practical and atonement theology, John is passionate about using the arts and reconciliation to offer a contemporary witness to everyone, regardless of their beliefs.



KEENE LECTURES



4 November: 7.00pm

Romans 13:1-7, the Divine Sword of the Empire, & the Opponent's Voice

"Let every person be subject to the governing authorities It is the agent of God to execute wrath on the wrongdoer." Throughout history, Romans 13:1-7 has emerged as a paradigmatic *locus classicus* invoked by Christians in support of war. But does a reading that finds Paul to be instructing his Christian readers to defend their government's military efforts capture his intent in this text?

In this lecture we'll critically examine this *pericope*, canvas popular readings, and explore the potential for a new interpretive way forward.



11 November: 7.00pm

War and Peace - A Chaplain's Perspective

Ruth Hake has been a military chaplain for 22 years, serving all over the world from Afghanistan to the Falkland Islands. In this lecture she will discuss the history of military chaplaincy in the British Armed Forces, and the development of chaplaincy into the 21st Century.

Drawing on her own experiences she will address the challenges of ministry within this unique environment, and consider how chaplaincy will evolve over the next decade.



25 November: 7.00pm

Religion, a cause of war or a means of peace

A recent UK survey found that half the population believes religion causes more harm than good, often linking it to war, oppression, and political misuse. Many are now indifferent or critical of religious belief. Major General (Retired) Tim Cross CBE will explore whether religion fuels conflict or fosters peace—not from an academic perspective, but through his military experience. Commissioned in 1971, he served in Northern Ireland, Cyprus, Iraq, and the Balkans. In 1999, he led NATO's humanitarian response in Kosovo, earning a CBE and the Wilkinson Sword of Peace for his efforts.

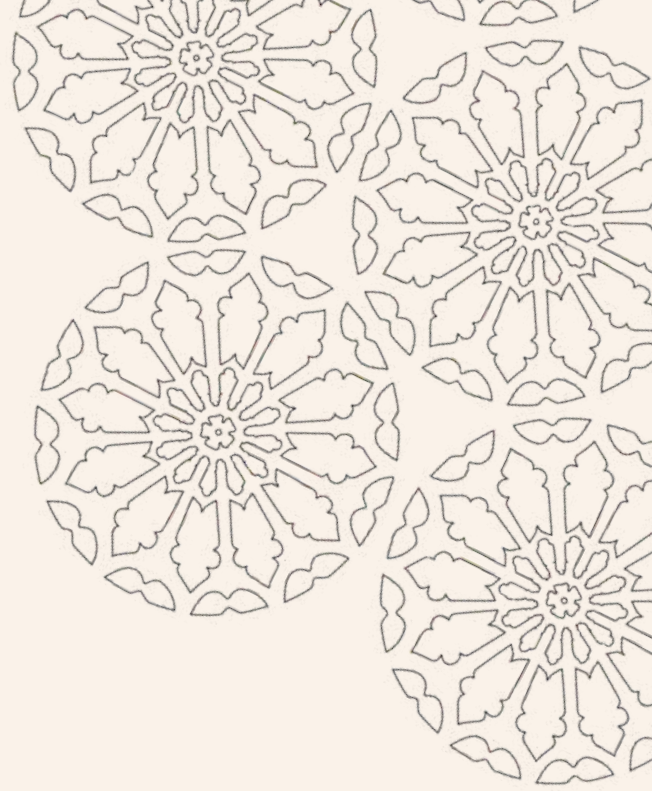
