Our service today includes a farewell and thanksgiving for the ministry of the **Revd Canon Ivor Moody**.

Ivor became Vice Dean and Canon Pastor of Chelmsford Cathedral in 2010. He chaired Essex Mind and Spirit, the Mid Essex Inter Faith Forum, the Chelmsford Single Homeless Forum and the Essex Faith Covenant. He was also chaplain to Essex County Council. Ivor has served all his professional life in the Diocese of Chelmsford. Ivor studied for a theology degree at King's College, London, and then trained for the priesthood at the College of the Resurrection, in Mirfield, West Yorkshire. He served curacies at St. Margaret's Leytonstone and St. Margaret's Leigh on Sea, before becoming vicar of St. John the Baptist, Tilbury Docks. In 1996 he moved to Chelmsford to take up a post as University Chaplain at the Chelmsford Campus of the Anglia Ruskin University, where he gained an MA in Pastoral Theology with the Cambridge Theological Federation. Ivor is married to Ruth and they have four grown up children.

Jesus said: 'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.


The Prayers of Intercession
